Geneva Lake and its vicinity, such as relics of Indian and pioneer life, stories of the early settlers, old letters, books, pamphlets, and photographs. It will place markers at various points of interest, trace out old trails, locate former Indian villages, and endeavor to stimulate general interest in local history. It is hoped that there may be established in time a museum for the proper display and preservation of the historical material collected. The collection already at hand has been given a temporary home at Yerkes Observatory. The society solicits gifts of material relating to the early life of Wisconsin. Such gifts will be carefully preserved and will be credited to the donors.

Making Extensive Survey

One piece of work already well underway is a survey of the shores of Geneva and Como lakes to discover evidences of the occupancy and activities of the Indians. Several camp sites, wigwam hearthstones, burial places, trails, stone implements, etc have been found in the first few days of exploration—enough to show that this is a particularly rich field for the archeologist. This survey is being made by Charles E. Brown, director of the State Historical Museum at Madison, assisted by his son, Theodore Brown. The results of this work will soon be published.

Four Markers Placed

The four bronze markers placed on boulders in July mark the places where the first whites saw Geneva Lake in 1831, the old Indian *(Cont. on page 3)*

trail along which they came from Fort Dearborn, now Chicago, to the four lakes at Madison and beyond, the location of the Potawatomi village at the head of the lake, and the site of Chief Big Foot's lodge in Fontana.

Historical Society Receives Grant Award

The Wisconsin Historical Society and the Wisconsin Council for Local History awarded the Williams Bay Historical Society a grant of \$696.00 to purchase PastPerfect collections management software. There is also a match required of museum supplies.

Pat Grove states that the grant award will enhance our efforts to start cata-

loging/archiving our collections and donations that are stored. The software has several features such as membership lists, newsletters, event announcements, financial statements, and connections to the other historical societies in the state. It will also be a repository of all our legal contracts and affiliations. We will work on this project in the upcoming winter months. PastPerfect is used by 70% of the historical societies in the state as their museum management system. We will need to purchase supplies and a computer to fully integrate the project. Please contact us if you interested or have had experience in archiving.

Plans Completed at Bay Meeting

Make Survey of Shores of Geneva Lake to Discover Traces of Indian Inhabitants In conformity with plans which had their beginning at the time of the unveiling of several memorial tablets at the head of Geneva Lake (last) July, a

tory on September 23rd to com-

plete an organization to be known as the Geneva Lake Historical Society. On the advice of the State Historical Society of Madison, a constitution was adopted which will permit the affiliation of the local society with the state organization.
